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



Regulation 178/2002




The European Union has developed a complex legal framework applicable to food production and marketing.

Food safety is the idea around which the system is organized.

In that sense, Regulation (EC) no 178/2002 stablishes that "Food shall not be placed on the market if it is unsafe" (art. 14.1)

D1 -> Legal framework overview





According to the regulation,

Food shall be deemed to be unsafe if it is considered to be:

- (a) injurious to health;
- (b) unfit for human consumption.



In particular: hygiene, safety, composition, packaging, labelling, new developments aspects (that is, GMO and novel food). Additionally, we shall take into consideration national regulations.

1 General Food Law

General Food Law: Regulation (EC) No 178/2002 laying down the general principles and requirements of food law



2 Hygiene

- Regulation (EC) No 852/2004 on the hygiene of foodstuffs
- Regulation (EC) No 853/2004 laying down specific hygiene rules for food of animal origin



3 Safety

- Regulation (EC) No 396/2005 on maximum residue levels of pesticides in or on food and feed of plant and animal origin

How are TORTILLAS regulated in EU?

There is **not a legal disposition that regulates** tortillas in the EU framework.
Its regulation has not been harmonised.
That means that we cannot find a law **that regulates just tortillas, or tortillas and related products**.

In that scenario, all the legal landscape that we've just painted it's applicable.







The last piece of the legal puzzle it's the national regulations. In that sense, it should be stated that the member States can develop national regulations that can establish additional requirements to tortillas, such as composition or labelling.

As an example, in Spain a type of tortillas is regulated in the bread regulation (Royal Decree 308/2019).



ADDITIVES REGULATION

What additives can be used in tortillas production?



The use of food additives is ruled by the Regulation 1333/2008 on food additives. Additionally, the specifications for food additives, that is, the characteristics of the additives, are stated in the **Regulation 231/2012**.

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Regulation 1333/2008 is **organized around food categories**, regarding which the food additives are allowed, and their maximum levels of use or restrictions, are stablished.

Annex II, Part E of the Regulation
1333/2008. The legal text lists the categories but does not include an explanation of the foodstuffs included in or excluded.
